Chainsaw safety

FALL is here, which means many of us will be dusting off our chainsaws to begin cutting firewood. Chainsaws allow us to work much faster than wielding an axe or hand saw, but gas-powered saws are an extremely dangerous tool when used incorrectly. Let's take a few moments and review some basic chainsaw safety.

Many times, the most overlooked part of chainsaw safety is routine maintenance. We've all seen someone using a stubborn chainsaw that won't start, won't cut and won't stay running. Making sure your saw is operating correctly with a well-sharpened chain is essential to safety and the longevity of the saw. A dull chain causes the operator to try to force the bar of the saw through the wood, which can cause damage to the chainsaw. The saw could also potentially "kick back" toward the operator, which often results in very serious injuries. Cleaning the air filter is a simple maintenance practice that is too often overlooked. A lack of air flow caused by a carburetor covered with wood chips will force the saw to run poorly. Keeping a saw well-maintained can alleviate these issues and many of the safety threats that accompany them.

Wearing the proper personal protective equipment can mean the difference between a successful day cutting or ending up in the emergency room with an avoidable injury. I have been hit in the eyes and face by flying wood chips many times, which makes a good pair of safety glasses worth their weight in gold. Other essential protective equipment such as ear plugs, gloves, boots, and saw chaps offer increased protection while operating a chainsaw. According to a 2014 article in *Incident Prevention Magazine*, "there were more than 28,500 chainsaw injuries in 1999. More than 36 percent were injuries to the legs and knees." These statistics represent the areas of the body that are most susceptible to a saw when it is being used improperly. Proper work boots provide support and sturdy footing when operating your saw. They also help protect your feet from briars, thorns, and rolling or dropped pieces of firewood.

Cutting firewood on a cool beautiful fall day is often a pleasant escape from the hustle and bustle of everyday life. While enjoying your time outdoors, it is important to remain alert to your surroundings. Never operate a chainsaw within 10 feet of another person. Instruct those who may be working with you not to come near you while the saw is running. Our natural reaction is to turn toward someone when we are tapped on the shoulder. That's not something you want to do with a running chainsaw in your hand. Make sure the area where you are cutting is free of debris and trip hazards. Most chainsaws are equipped with a chain brake, which should be applied if you need to move more than a few feet to make your next cut.

In closing, remember to think safety the next time you head out with the chainsaw. The most important part of your day is returning home safe and unharmed to those you love.

Lineworkers hone pole-top rescue skills

IT COULD happen anytime, without warning. Maybe it's during outage restoration after a storm or during routine line maintenance on a great weather day. No matter when it happens, if a lineworker who has climbed a utility pole becomes disabled, getting that person down from the pole quickly and safely is the initial first-aid task.

To be prepared for the worst, Valley REC's lineworkers honed their response skills during safety training Aug. 14 and 15. The Pennsylvania Rural Electric Association (PREA) provided the instruction to Valley personnel in the Martinsburg, Huntingdon and Shade Gap districts, with each block of instruction lasting several hours.

"Anything could happen on any given day," says Randy Hoover, a PREA safety training instructor. "Pole-top rescue is important. It should be second nature to lineworkers. I hope no one ever has to experience it. But you never know."

As a trainer, one of Hoover's responsibilities is annually reviewing pole-top rescue procedures with co-op lineworkers across the state. A rescue could become necessary due to contact with an energized line, a heart attack or stroke, or even a bee sting that causes a lineworker to go into anaphylactic shock.

The rescue process involves a lineworker donning climbing gear, ascending the pole, affixing a pulley to the pole with a short length of rope, and then manually lowering the casualty to the ground after unfastening the victim's own climbing gear from around the pole.

The lineworkers also had a refresher course on operating a bucket from the lower set of controls, located in the bed of the truck. Should a lineworker become unresponsive while aloft in a bucket and unable to operate the lift controls within the bucket, the procedure is for the rescuer to lower the boom using the alternate set of controls, then tilt the victim out of the bucket at ground level.

Hoover stresses that in an actual emergency, responding lineworkers would have to decide if an immediate "mayday" call is needed and by what means — radio or cellphone depending on service availability. Coworkers of the injured lineworker would also have to decide where to have first responders meet them and how to get the casualty to a pick-up point if working in a right-of-way far from roads.

"There are a lot of different ways to do pole-top rescue," Hoover says. "And there are a lot of tough decisions to be made."

Hoover notes that Pennsylvania's co-ops have seen a lot of lineworker

retirements in recent years and says that lineworkers just starting their co-op careers have been trained on proper pole-top rescue procedures from the start.

Lineworkers often work in two-person teams. Hoover says guys who work together for a long time learn to anticipate each other's next move and depend on each other to be ready to respond in an emergency situation.
