Remembering Iollipops and much more during National Co-op Month

I FIRST heard of electric cooperatives in the fall of 1972. My parents moved our family from the former village of Aitch, razed for the expansion of Raystown Lake, to our newly built home in a fledgling housing development three miles away. Prior to that, we had lived in a home served by the local investor-owned electric utility.

Almost immediately there were differences with Valley Rural Electric Cooperative (REC). My parents had to read our electric meter every month. Sometimes, they would let us kids write the numbers on the card. When we accompanied our parents to pay the light bill and drop off the reading, the ladies at the front counter gave us lollipops — I often chose orange. My parents received annual invitations to meetings and checks for something called capital credits. Also, two publications, *Penn Lines* and *Valley News*, regularly arrived in our mailbox.

An avid reader, I would read these magazines, especially as I grew older. I learned our electric company was truly OUR electric company. My parents were members of an electric cooperative. This meant they were part owners.

As we celebrate National Co-op Month, it's important to note that this is the main defining feature of a cooperative; it's a business owned by the members it serves. This membership is voluntary and open. Anyone who can reasonably use its services can join.

Members democratically control their cooperative, voting for directors

chosen from among the membership. Members contribute money to the co-op via membership fees and timely payments for services. The cooperative, guided by the elected directors, operates in a not-for-profit manner; returns excess money, called capital credits, to the members; and strives to be an independent, self-sustaining organization. While maintaining this autonomy, the co-op cooperates with other cooperatives, offering mutual support and forming alliances to work together.

A co-op offers training and education to its members and employees to develop and maintain the business. It also provides information to the public, especially young people and opinion leaders, about the nature and benefits of cooperatives and cooperation. This concern extends to the local areas served by the co-op. Policies and programs approved by the directors improve the quality of life for folks in these communities.

Valley REC is just one of 831 distribution cooperatives that supply power to 42 million Americans in 48 states, covering 56% of the nation's landmass and reaching 21 million businesses, homes, schools, and farms. More than 60 generation and transmission (G&T) cooperatives, including our own Allegheny Electric Cooperative, Inc. in Harrisburg, produce or purchase power on behalf of their member distribution co-ops. G&Ts draw from a diverse mix of energy sources to

Co-op's head of member services begins third military deployment to the Middle East

VALLEY Rural Electric Cooperative's (REC) vice president of member services is deploying to the Middle East with his Pennsylvania Army National Guard unit. Doug Roles' mobilization begins this month and marks the third time he has been deployed to the region.

It's expected he will return to work at the co-op's corporate office, near Huntingdon, in late summer 2023. Roles is mobilizing with approximately 500 soldiers from the 28th Infantry Division's headquarters battalion, based in Harrisburg.

"I appreciate the support Valley Rural Electric shows to employees requiring military leave," Roles says. "My co-workers are staying flexible and finding new ways to manage the day-today work of the member services department in my absence."

Roles serves as editor of Valley REC's local pages in *Penn Lines* magazine. He also plays a large part in planning co-op events, such as annual meetings and district nominating meetings, and directs media relations.

Some of his work for the cooperative mirrors his military service. Roles, who holds the rank of master sergeant, serves as a print journalist in the division's public affairs office.

He will spend most of his deployed time participating in the same mission that required his deployment in 2018. The headquarters battalion will again provide mission command for several thousand troops conducting security operations throughout the Middle East. Additionally, the battalion will conduct battle staff training directly with partner nation military units.

Roles has served in the Pennsylvania Guard since 2002. In addition to the 2018 mobilization, he previously deployed to Iraq in 2008-2009 with the division's 56th Stryker Brigade

Combat Team. He has also participated in overseas training in Egypt, France, Lithuania, and South Korea, and earlier this summer spent nearly four weeks at the National Training Center at Fort Irwin, Calif., as part of a 20-soldier senior trainer team.

"Deployments always come with their challenges, first and foremost being time away from family and balancing the disruption to your civilian employment," Roles says. "I'm excited to deploy, again, with my unit, but I will certainly be looking forward to getting back to normal next fall."

Doug and his wife, Jody, have a 20-year-old son, Hunter. They reside in McVeytown, Mifflin County.

provide affordable and reliable electricity, with nearly two-thirds coming from low- or zero-carbon sources. Approximately 60% to 70% of the electricity Valley REC delivers to members comes from non-carbon sources.

Many things have changed during the 50 years I have known about Valley REC. Digital meters have eliminated the need for members to submit readings. Automated phone calls inform members of planned outages. Outage management software helps lineworkers pinpoint unplanned outages more quickly. Automated payment systems allow folks to pay their bills from the convenience of their phones or computers.

However, Valley's commitment to the core principles of a cooperative has never changed. The co-op remains member-focused with an emphasis on personal interactions. You can always talk to a real person about your needs or questions. Oh, and the folks at the front counter still hand out lollipops to the kids — and the kids-at-heart. I recommend orange.
