DESPITE THE ENDLESS EFFORTS YOUR co-op puts forth in keeping the lights on there are always instances when outages occur. Whether it be from a planned system outage for upgrades or from a severe storm that rolls through, there will be moments when interruptions occur. While Valley line crews work diligently to get these outages restored as fast and safely as possible, sometimes the power disruptions occur at inconvenient times and for longer than we would hope. The truth of the matter is

That is why Valley's electrical services department — Valley Rural Energy Services — offers the installation of Generac[®] generators: to ensure you never have to worry about when the next outage occurs.

Since the start of Valley Rural Energy Services in 2017, our electricians have installed more than 150 generators. We expect this number to grow over the next several years as more consumers see the benefits of never having the worry of losing power, especially during severe weather conditions. 2023 Work Plan Improvements

VALLEY RURAL ELECTRIC Cooperative (REC) operations personnel and line crews will have another busy year in 2023 as the co-op continues to improve system reliability and power quality.

The cooperative was busy finalizing the 2022 work plan with the relocation and construction of the substation in the Sinking Valley area. This project was necessary due to the age and poor location of the existing substation that served the membership in this area for more than 60 years. The excavation for the new substation began in early May 2022 and construction was completed in the beginning of December. The cooperative is now waiting on First-Energy to construct a new metering point, off their existing transmission, that will provide a delivery point to the new substation. If all goes as planned, the new substation will be placed in service in early spring.

In November 2022, a section of primary underground wire was upgraded at Lake Raystown Resort. The wire supplies power to the restaurant, marina area and campground. There is roughly 1,300 feet of primary underground wire remaining to be replaced that supplies power to the water treatment plant. This upgrade will take place in the spring. When this work is completed, the main circuit of primary underground wire supplying power to the resort will be upgraded.

In January 2023, crews began replacing 3,900 feet of primary underground wire at Canoe Creek State Park. The primary wire has been in place since the park was established in the late 1970s. The upgrade also includes the retirement and installation of new transformers feeding the park

facilities. The work is to be completed in April.

In Harrisonville, Fulton County, construction will take place with the reconductoring of old deteriorated wire, along with 40 poles being replaced. This project will consist of nearly 9 miles of construction work. The work will be completed in the spring. Throughout the course of 2023, Valley REC will be working in Juniata County to finish conversion work that has been ongoing since 2016. When this work is completed, the entire Reeds Gap substation's distribution system will be converted to a higher voltage. The higher voltage helps with the system's reliability due to the distance of some of the distribution lines **ALL NEW:** A full system upgrade to the Canoe Creek State Park facility will be completed in late spring. The upgrade will include the retirement and installation of new transformers feeding the park facilities.

serving the membership in this area.

Valley REC will also continue working on the sectionalizing project in 2023. The work involves adding cutouts and sectionalizers throughout Valley's entire distribution system. The additional sectionalizing devices are being installed to reduce the number of people affected when an outage occurs. This work will take place in the Huntingdon, Shade Gap and Martinsburg districts throughout the year. The sectionalizing program began in 2021 and will be completed in 2025.

Valley REC will also concentrate on replacing utility poles that failed Osmose pole inspections in 2022. This work will be conducted throughout 2023. ^(a)



FEBRUARY – AMERICAN HEART MONTH

Why do we observe American Heart Month every February?

American Heart Month is observed to raise awareness of the importance of a healthy heart and to encourage healthly habits that help reduce the risk of heart disease. Every year more than 600,000 Americans die from heart disease. It is the No. 1 cause of deaths for most groups. Heart disease affects all ages, genders and ethnicities. Risk factors include high cholesterol, high blood pressure, smoking, diabetes and excessive alcohol use.

Do you know how to keep your heart healthy?

You can take an active role in reducing your risk for heart disease by eating a healthy diet, engaging in physical activity and managing your cholesterol and blood pressure. February is a great time to start some heart-healthy habits.

Some interesting facts about heart health are:

1. One in five heart attacks occurs

without the person even knowing they had one.

2. Women may experience different symptoms than men. These include pain in the back, arm, neck, or shoulder; nausea; fatique; shortness of breath; and vomiting.

3. Women under the age of 50 are twice as likely to die of a heart attack as men in the same age group.

4. Heart attacks are more likely to occur on Monday mornings than other days of the week. Scientists attribute this to the disruption in our circadian rhythm over the weekend which leads to increased blood pressure and other changes to the nervous system.

5. If you drink one or more diet sodas a day, your chances of having a heart attack are 43% higher than those who drink regular soda or none at all.



So, why not start this February and observe American Heart Month by following these tips.

1. Staying active, eating healthy and watching our weight are all important parts of maintaining a healthy cardiovascular system. Pick up a new heart-healthy habit like jogging or substituting sodas with water and try to stick with it for a whole month.

2. Learn about the risk factors for heart disease, the ways you can prevent them, and the lifestyle choices that can help you stay healthy.

3. If you are worried you might be at risk for heart disease, ask your doctor to perform a simple cholesterol test to let you know if you're at risk and should make adjustments to your diet.
